REGISTRATION INSTRUCTIONS

STEP ONE: Meet with your faculty advisor within the two weeks prior to registration.

Your faculty advisor will give you **four documents**.

1. A **Registration Appointment Sheet**, which has your alternate Pin Number ALT_PIN which you will use if you register on the Web and the time after which you may register. It is valid for this registration period only;
2. An **Instruction Sheet** for registering on the Web, which is self-explanatory. You will need your user I.D. (or e-mail name) and password;
3. A **Course Request Form**. You and your advisor should review and sign this form. You keep the white and yellow copies and your advisor keeps the pink copy. **To register at the registrar's office you need the white copy.**
4. A **Biographical Information Sheet**. You will check and correct the information on it and leave it with your advisor who will return it to the Registrar.

Make sure that your I.D. number is correct on all forms. Use the proper course registration number, subject, course, and section numbers on all forms. Be sure when you are scheduling classes that there are NO TIME CONFLICTS with your other courses.

STEP TWO: Register either on the Web or at the Registrar's office at or after the following times:

- L3's & L1's: Anytime after 8:00 a.m. Monday, November 2, 2009.**
- L2's: Anytime after 8:00 a.m. Tuesday, November 3, 2009.**

You must register between Monday, Nov. 2 & Friday, Nov. 6. After that, registration can only be done at the beginning of the Spring Semester.

Closed Classes: If a class is closed when you register, ask the Dean's Office to put you on a waiting list for that class. As openings occur, preference will be given to those on the waiting list. No waiting lists will be started until the registrar advises us that a course is closed. There will be no over-loading of any class without a yellow overload slip signed by the Instructor and then by the Associate Dean.

Guidelines for First-Year Law Students

1. **You must register for:**
 - Contracts
 - Property
 - Torts
 - Civil Procedure
 - Legal Writing
 - Criminal Law

2. You must stay in the same Section as in Fall Semester.

3. **Summer Starters** must sign up for:
 - Property
 - Torts
 - Contracts
 - Legal Writing
 - Evidence

4. Stay in the same Section of these courses as in the Fall.

Guidelines for Upper Class Students

1. **Recommended Spring Second Year Courses:**

- Constitutional Law 2 (tested on every Bar)
- Business Organizations 2
- Evidence (if not taken in Fall)
- Estates, Wills & Trusts

It is advisable that you take these courses your Second Year to avoid potential conflicts in your third year with other bar courses.

When you meet with your advisor, plan your last three semesters in law school. Take a course, if possible, in every area of law tested on the Bar in your state. The Bar-Bri Digest lists all courses for all states. You can also find a link to every state's bar examination office at www.ncbex.org.

2. **Recommended Courses for the third year of law school:**

Fall

- Commercial Law: Sales & Secured Transactions (Tested on almost every bar)
- Domestic Relations (Only offered in the Fall) (Tested on many bars)
- Estates, Wills & Trusts* (Tested on every bar)
- Mortgage Law (Covers mortgages and other issues which are tested in the Property portion of the Multi-State)
- Real Estate Transactions
- Real Estate: Commercial
- Products Liability (Tested in the Torts portion of the Multi-State)
- Legal Profession* (Required)
- Administrative Law (Basic course for practice on the local, state and federal levels)

*(also offered in the Spring)

Spring:

- Criminal Procedure (Tested on every bar - both essay and multi-state, offered in Spring only)
- Commercial Law: Payments (Tested on almost every bar exam)
- Remedies (Good review and bar prep)
- Transition to Ohio Practice (For Ohio bar students, a good bar prep course)
- Legal Profession (Required) (Also offered in the Fall)

3. **Specialized Sequences:** In your planning, review the recommended sequence for the taxation courses if you plan to specialize in taxation, business planning or estate planning. Similarly, review the recommended sequence for the bankruptcy specialization.

4. **Upper Level Required Courses:** Make sure that you take all of the upper-level required courses, in addition to the first year required courses:

- Constitutional Law 1
- Business Organizations 1
- Evidence
- Legal Profession

5. **Seminar Requirement:** All students must complete an upper division seminar with a grade of "C" or better before graduation. Seminars are limited to 12 students.

6. **Skills Requirement:** All students must complete at least 10 hours of designated "skills" classes before graduation. In the course listings herein skills courses are identified. *All clinic courses are skills courses.* You may not earn more than six of your ten skills hours in clinic courses.
7. **Adding and Dropping Classes:** You may add classes during the first two weeks of the semester. You may drop classes during the first three weeks of the semester. Please see the semester calendar for other important dates. **SPORTS LAW MAY BE ADDED OR DROPPED ONLY WITHIN THE FIRST WEEK OF CLASS.**
8. **Check courses with prerequisites:** Plan ahead for third year courses by taking the proper prerequisites. Note especially the prerequisites for Business Planning and Estate Planning. Also check the clinic offerings. Some clinics require Civil Practice: An Introduction, or Criminal Practice: An Introduction.
9. **Registration for Moot Court:** Only students who have been selected to represent the College of Law on an interscholastic Moot Court Team that will prepare a brief may register for this course. No student may register for Moot Court (LAW-1396) and Law Review (LAW-1384) in the same semester.

Registration for Clinic Courses

1. **Meet with Professor Ward between October 19 and October 30** to select a placement site. (Our Clinic Offerings are listed below. On October 14 Professor Ward will hold an information session. Please make every effort to attend.)
2. Professor Ward will send your name and approved placement site to the Associate Dean.
3. The Associate Dean will pre-register you for your placement site before formal registration starts.
4. No other clinic registration will be permitted.
5. When you meet with your faculty advisor, let him/her know that you are registered for clinic.
Do not put clinic on your course request.
6. Apply for Ohio legal intern certificate (form on website)

You may register for three or six credits for clinic in most cases. (See schedule) To earn three credits you must work 112 hours at the placement site; six credits, 224 hours at the placement site; for a judicial externship, 77 hours.

Keep in mind that registering for a Clinical Placement is a commitment to a real program. The program has real cases involving real clients. Professionalism requires that you follow through on your commitment. It is assumed that you will honor this commitment and will not drop the class without a serious reason and without prior discussion with Professor Ward.

CLINIC OFFERINGS

1610.01 - OHIO NORTHERN UNIVERSITY LEGAL CLINIC: The representation of clients in civil litigation matters such as family law, social security disability, and other general civil litigation matters at the ONU Legal Clinic in Lima, Ohio, under the supervision of a licensed staff attorney. Prerequisites: Successful completion of 58 hours of law college credit and an intern certificate from the Supreme Court of Ohio. Prerequisite or co-requisite: LAW 1248 (Civil Practice: an Introduction).

1610.02 - LITIGATION CLINIC: The representation of clients in civil litigation matters such as family law, landlord/tenant and other general civil litigation matters at a local legal aid organization under the supervision of practicing attorneys affiliated with the legal aid organization. Prerequisites: Successful completion of 58 hours of law college credit and an intern certificate from the Supreme Court of Ohio. Prerequisite or co-requisite: LAW 1248 (Civil Practice: an Introduction).

1610.03 - CORPORATE TRANSACTIONAL CLINIC: The representation of non-profit organizations and local churches in corporate matters including incorporating, obtaining tax exempt status with the Internal Revenue Service and real property issues. Prerequisites: Successful completion of 58 hours of law college credit and an intern certificate from the Supreme Court of Ohio. Prerequisite or co-requisite: LAW 1236 (Business Organizations 1).

1610.04 - BANKRUPTCY CLINIC: Under the supervision of a bankruptcy panel trustee or bankruptcy practitioner, the researching, drafting pleadings and making court appearances in Federal Bankruptcy Court. Prerequisites: Successful completion of 58 hours of law college credit and an intern certificate from the Supreme Court of Ohio. Prerequisite or co-requisite: LAW 1224 (Bankruptcy and Creditor's Rights).

1610.05 - ENVIRONMENTAL CLINIC: Under the supervision of licensed attorneys, placement with a non-profit environmental group in Ohio; engaging in research, drafting of pleadings and other activities pertaining to environmental law. Prerequisites: Successful completion of 58 hours of law college credit and an intern certificate from the Supreme Court of Ohio. Prerequisite or co-requisite: either LAW 1312 (Environmental Law) or LAW 1525 (Environmental Law Seminar).

1610.06 - GOVERNMENTAL CLINIC: Under the supervision of attorneys from different governmental agencies, researching, drafting memos and engaging in other activities handled by the agency in question. Prerequisites: Successful completion of 58 hours of law college credit and an intern certificate from the Supreme Court of Ohio. Prerequisite or co-requisite: LAW 1248 (Civil Practice: an Introduction).

1610.07 - NON-PROFIT LITIGATION CLINIC: Under the supervision of practicing attorneys or administrators, providing assistance to non-profit agencies on legal issues confronting them. Prerequisites: Successful completion of 58 hours of law college credit and an intern certificate from the Supreme Court of Ohio. Prerequisite or co-requisite: LAW 1248 (Civil Practice: an Introduction).

1610.08 - MUNICIPAL GOVERNMENT CLINIC: Students work with Municipal Government Solicitors or City Law Directors on civil litigation and criminal litigation issues arising within the context of a municipal government. Prerequisite or co-requisite: LAW 1400 (Municipal Corporations).

1630.01 - PROSECUTION CLINIC: Placement in prosecutor office, involving the representation of the state in criminal misdemeanors under the supervision of a licensed practicing attorney. Prerequisite LAW 1296 (Criminal Practice: An Introduction) or LAW 1297 (Criminal Practice: Advanced).

1630.02 - PUBLIC DEFENDER CLINIC: Placement in public defender office involving the representation of criminal defendants under the supervision of a licensed practicing attorney. Prerequisite LAW 1296 (Criminal Practice: An Introduction) or LAW 1297 (Criminal Practice: Advanced).

1670.01 - JUDICIAL EXTERNSHIP 1: Under the supervision of selected state and federal judges, performing research, writing and other court-related duties that the judge assigns. Prerequisites: None. 2 credits.

1671.01 – JUDICIAL EXTERNSHIP 2: This clinical course would entail placement with a state or federal judge for a total of 77 hours during the course of the semester performing research, writing and other court related duties. Students may not be placed with the same judge who supervised their work in Judicial Externship 1. Moreover, students will be required to write a paper or submit a substantial draft opinion. Prerequisites: LAW 1670 (Judicial Externship 1). 2 credits

Registration Procedure for Independent Study/Law Review Comment

Identify a faculty member who you would like to supervise your independent study project or law review comment. Ask if he or she is willing to supervise you. No faculty member may supervise more than two such projects in any semester. Complete the Independent Study/Law Review Sign-up Form available at the front office or on the college web site. Have the supervising faculty member sign the form and submit it to the Dean's office. Failure to do so will result in your being withdrawn from independent study or law review comment.

Course Descriptions for Independent Study & Law Review:

Independent Study (LAW 1336)

2 Credits

Independent research under the supervision of a member of the Law School faculty. The scope and subject matter of the research project to be determined by the teacher who agrees to undertake the supervision and grading of the student's research. Independent Study may be taken only one time.

Law Review (LAW 1384)

2 Credits

Writing a Law Review comment of publishable quality.

There are three (3) courses that have the word "Estate" as part of their name. One of them is a property course, and two of them are tax courses. Full descriptions of these courses appear in the College of Law catalog. A summary is provided below.

LAW-1320 Estates, Wills & Trusts

Offered each semester - 3 credits - Elective

The law of intestate and testate succession; formal requirements of wills, testamentary capacity, undue influence, fraud and mistake, holographic and nuncupative wills integration and incorporation by reference; revocation, republication, revival and amendment. The nature, creation, and elements of a trust; rights, liabilities and duties of settlor, trustee and beneficiary; creditors' rights against trust property; modification and termination of a trust, charitable trusts; resulting and constructive trusts, and general fiduciary responsibilities and administrative problems.

LAW-1452 Taxation of Transfers: Estates & Gifts

Spring Semester - 3 credits - Elective

The operation and use of federal tax provisions applicable to inter vivos and testamentary dispositions of property with particular emphasis upon matters of federal estate and gift taxation. Prerequisite: LAW 1440.

LAW-1316 Estate Planning

Fall Semester - 3 credits - Elective

An examination, from a family estate planning perspective, of legal principles critical to the development of an effective dispositive plan. The principles of state law relating to (a) wills, trusts, and other dispositive instruments, and (b) the creation and transfer of various property interests, and the principles of Federal tax law (under income tax, gift tax, estate tax, and GST tax statutes) pertinent to the development of a variety of estate plans. Requirement to draft dispositive instruments designed to resolve both common and unusual planning problems. Prerequisites: LAW 1320, 1440 and 1452.

Full-Time Status & Study at Other Law Schools

Full-Time Student Status Required: A student must register for and complete courses totaling at least 12 hours in order to receive a full semester's residency credit.

Six semesters averaging 14.5 hours each are necessary to satisfy the 88 hours required for graduation.

Tacking: The college of law requires six semesters of residency—i.e., six semesters in which you take a minimum of 12 credits. You may tack two partial* semesters together to make one full semester. For example, if you take 6 credits in the summer of '05, you make tack them to 6 credits taken in the summer of '06 to constitute one semester of residency. So long as you have all required courses and 88 hours, you may then graduate one semester early.

*You may not borrow hours from a full semester for tacking purposes, e.g., you may not tack 3 credits from a 15 credit semester to a nine-credit semester. Only two partial semesters may be tacked.

Students may take no more than 18 hours in any semester. Students, who wish to take less than 12 hours in a semester, MUST receive prior approval from the Associate Dean.

Changes of Address and Marital Status: Changes in your home address must be reported to the Office of the Registrar as soon as possible. It is also the responsibility of the student to notify the Office of the Registrar of any change in marital status or expected date of graduation. The Office of Residence Life must be notified of any change in local address.

Summer Study Elsewhere: In the U.S. or Abroad is permitted under the following procedure.

- Fill out a Transient Status Request Form obtained in the front office.
- Attach catalogue course descriptions from the University you plan to attend.
- Fill out a Letter of Good Standing Request Form also in the front office.

Review the following rules found in the law school catalogue:

6.10 Course Work At Another Law School

1. Courses satisfactorily completed in other law schools may be accepted for credit by the College of Law at the discretion of the dean. Credit will be granted only for courses in which a grade of "C" or better is achieved.
2. Courses thus accepted for credit by the College of Law will normally be given credit toward graduation only; the grade itself will not be transferred. The provisions of this section shall apply both to students who transfer to the College of Law from other law schools and to those enrolled in the College of Law who take courses elsewhere with the permission of the dean in accordance with the provisions of Section 9.03 of these Rules

9.00 Study at Another Law School

Students desiring to receive credit towards the degree requirements of the College of Law through study at another law school must apply for and obtain the permission of the dean of the College of Law pursuant to the requirements of this section and the other sections of these rules incorporated herein.

9.01 Part-Time Study:

Transient status will routinely be granted (up to the equivalent of one semester's worth of credits) for students requesting permission to take courses on a part-time basis at another American Bar Association accredited law school (or at a program sponsored by such a law school abroad). An application form must be completed (available from the administrative offices) indicating the name of the law school, the program to be attended, and the courses to be taken.

9.03 Credit

1. Elective course work taken at another law school is subject to the conditions of Section 6.06 (a) and (b) of these Rules.
2. Credit for approved work at another law school shall only be given for courses in which a grade of "C" or better is achieved pursuant to Section 6.10(a) of these Rules.
