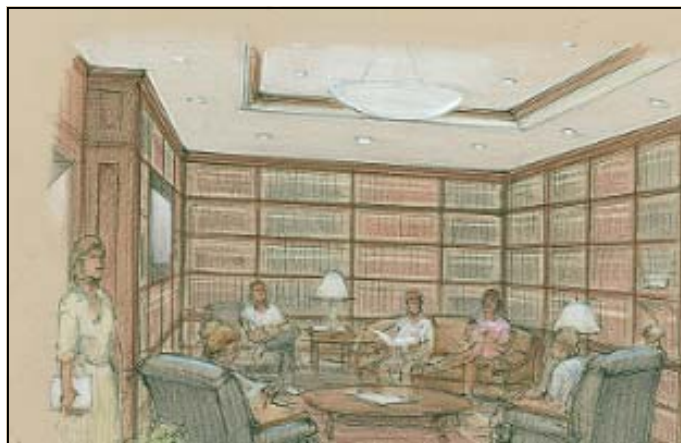




## Library Construction Update

As the semester winds down, library renovations are continuing in preparation for construction of the Hanson Reading Room this summer. Here are the latest updates:

- The new microforms area is now finished. Wood end panels have been installed on the compact shelving units, and most of the microfiche has now been shelved and arranged in the new area.
- The transformation of the old microforms room into the new technology center should be completed in the next two weeks. Please note that the current computer lab will not be moved until after graduation, when we anticipate that the new lab will be available for use. We will try to keep the transition period to a minimum as computers and equipment are moved into the new space.
- In order for construction to begin promptly after graduation, some books are currently being moved from the Reference and Reading Rooms to other locations in the library. This process will continue over the next few weeks. If you need help finding books that have moved, please ask a member of the library staff to assist you.
- During the summer, depending on the recommendations of the architects and contractors, it is likely that we will need to close the south side of the library because of noise and safety concerns. Books on this side of the library may not be directly accessible, but they can still be retrieved for your use by library staff. The new technology center, however, will be available all summer.



We will continue to try to minimize disruptions as we prepare for this major construction project. Please let us know if you have any questions about the ongoing renovations.

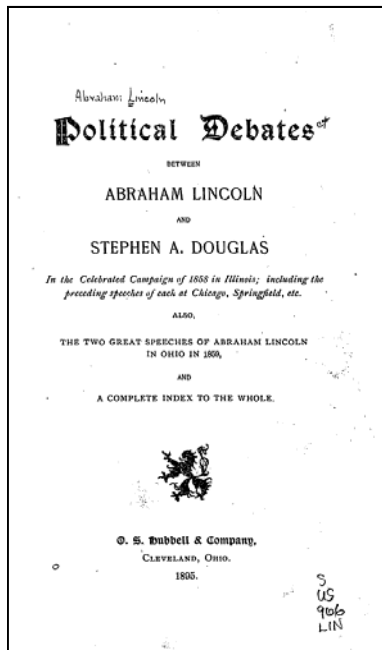

## New Database: *The Making of Modern Law*

Earlier this year, the law library acquired *The Making of Modern Law: Legal Treatises 1800-1926*, a database of British and American legal treatises of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries.



This fully searchable database contains the original page images of more than 21,000 works that include a wide range of analytical, theoretical, and practical legal literature. Many key legal thinkers, such as Bentham, Austin, Maine, Kent, Story, and Holmes, to name just a few, are represented. (See the example to the left, an 1895 printing of the famous Lincoln-Douglas Debates of 1858)

This outstanding collection is available from the library's Subscription Services page, and will be of interest to scholars and researchers in many areas, including domestic and international law, legal history, business and economics, politics and government, national defense, criminology, religion, education, labor and social welfare, and military justice.
