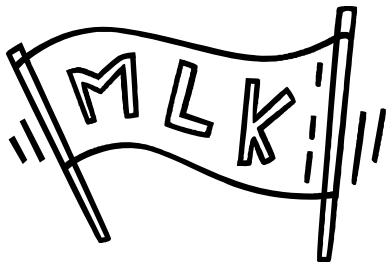




Martin Luther King, Jr. Day Hours

Library Construction Update

As mentioned in our last newsletter, the first phase of library renovations began over Christmas break. The microforms collection has been moved from the south side of the library to a new location near the law review office on the north side of the library. The microfiche cabinets have been placed in space-saving compact shelving units and a new room for doing research with this collection using the microfiche reader-printer has been built. Many of the carrels that were previously in this area have been moved to other areas on the north side.

This first phase will continue in January and February with the installation of light fixtures, a door for the new room, and wood end panels on the shelving units, which are all on order. We plan to have most of this work done at times when the library is not open in order to minimize disruptions.



The second phase of renovations will start on the former microforms room during spring break at the end of February. This space will gradually be transformed into a new technology center. Eventually, this center will house the computer lab, Larry Baumgardner's office, and a technology workroom, bringing all of these functions into one centralized location in the library.

All of these renovations are in preparation for the creation of the Hanson Reading Room this summer. This reading room will honor Eugene Hanson, who served as dean from 1958 to 1973 and oversaw great expansion of the law school. More information about this project can be found online at:

New Additions to the Legal Movie Collection

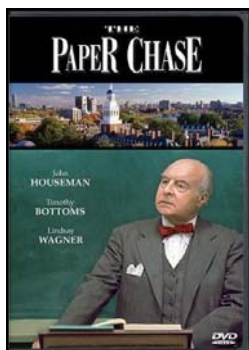

***Legally Blonde* (2001)**

“When a blonde sorority queen is dumped by her boyfriend, she decides to follow him to law school to get him back. Once there, she learns she has more legal savvy than she ever imagined. Based on the book by Amanda Brown.”



***The Paper Chase* (1973)**



“A moving story of a first-year Harvard Law School student (Hart) who comes to terms with his dreams in America’s most competitive school. Hart finds he must survive much more than the pressures, all-night cramming and insecurities he expected. He becomes fearful of a brilliant professor who terrorizes some, inspires others, and who easily separates the men from the boys.”

Did You Know?

One of the law library’s more recent database acquisitions is Columbia International Affairs Online (CIAO). CIAO is produced by Columbia University and is a comprehensive source for theory and research on international affairs. It publishes a wide variety of scholarly materials from 1991 to the present, including working papers, research projects, conference proceedings, books, journals, and policy briefs. CIAO also contains a variety of teaching materials, including case studies, course packs of background readings, and an atlas with detailed country information.

CIAO can be searched in a variety of ways, including by keyword, author, title, subject, region, and date. This database can be accessed by going to the library’s home page at <http://www.law.onu.edu/Library.html>, then clicking on the link for Library Subscription Services, and then clicking on the link for CIAO.
